A Note from the Playwright

Can this play about toxic masculinity, the #metoo movement, and a world on the brink of extinction be funny? I sincerely hope you find it so. Well, at least until you don't.

When my dramaturg, director and partner-in-crime Eve Muson and I first started conjuring "Girls on a Dirt Pile," we discussed a number of iconic Greek stories casting our webs for the Ur myths that speak to us in 2019. Both agitated and inspired by the #metoo moment, we wanted to write a play for our young feminist students of all genders. We decided to tell an epic story about the birth of the gods, and how, with their arrival comes gender inequality.

Into that crucible we threw Zeus, Hades, Demeter, Hecate and Persephone; out came tales of power, control, treachery and a brave young woman who stands up to her abusers. It's a good story and a noble one, but as two old crones spinning a play for young people, we kept laughing at the ridiculousness of it all. Mostly, we laughed at ourselves. In the end, we knew <u>we</u> needed those old witches, too. They take our young gods on a wild ride, cackling and teasing, until the horrors of our shared folly arrives.
