
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Director's Note



A Note on "Form"

As the play starts, you'll hear a lot of discussion on stage concerning "New Forms." At its core, this play grapples with the same eternal question that haunts every artist: how do we find the newest form to tell our stories best?

In our production, we've embraced this quest for innovation in ways that resonate deeply with our audience. For the first time in the UMBC Proscenium Theatre's history, we are placing the audience on stage, breaking down traditional barriers and exploring new actor-audience relationships. Also, throughout rehearsals, the cast, designers, and I have delved into the various theatrical -isms—from realism to absurdism, from naturalism to expressionism—seeking to understand how these frameworks can serve the heart of our narrative.

However, as we've explored these complexities, I've come to realize that the most profound moments in this piece occur when we let go of our preoccupations with theatricality. The true power of storytelling lies in our ability to connect, to listen, and to share our humanity. In those moments of silence and vulnerability, we transcend the roles of actor and audience, becoming participants in a collective ritual of storytelling.

In essence, the strongest "new form" I've discovered is perhaps the oldest one: gathering in the dark, around a (sometimes metaphorical) campfire, sharing our tales as humans connecting with humans. It's here, in this space of authenticity and simplicity, that we honor the original storytellers—the Griots who pass down wisdom through the ages.

I invite you to join us on this journey, to sit with us in this unique space we've created, and to listen closely as we share our story. Together, we can find new meaning in the familiar, and perhaps, a little bit of ourselves in each other.

Director Bio



Gerrad Alex Taylor (he/him/his) is an award-winning director and multidisciplinary theatre artist based out of the Greater Baltimore region and an assistant professor in the Department of Theatre at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County. His current creative work and research centers around creating space that preserves history and celebrates culture of the Global Majority.

In 2021 he was named one of Baltimore's "40 Under 40" by the Washington Business Journal. In 2020, he founded Chesapeake Shakespeare's Black Classical Acting Ensemble (BCAE), an affinity space for black actors interested in training and exposure of the "classics" and what an expansion of the classical canon may look like today. In 2024, Gerrad joined colleague Lizzi Albert to take on the roles of

Co-Artistic Directors of Perisphere Theater in Montgomery County, MD.

He holds a BA in Neuroscience from the Johns Hopkins University and an MFA in Performance from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. He has worked with theatres and educational institutions across the country including the Chesapeake Shakespeare Company, Perisphere Theater, Great River Shakespeare Festival, Shakespeare Festival St. Louis, Pacific Conservatory Theatre-PCPA, Children's Theatre of Annapolis, Everyman Theatre, Constellation Theatre Company, Mosaic Theatre Company, Arena Stage, Studio Theatre, and Washington Stage Guild. He is a member of the Actors' Equity Association and an Advanced Actor Combatant with the Society of American Fight Directors.

Playwright Bio



Aaron Posner is an award-winning director, playwright, teacher, and former Artistic Director of Philadelphia's Arden Theatre and New Jersey's Two River Theatre. He has directed more than 150 productions at major regional theaters across the country including virtually every theatre in the DC area. As a playwright, his re-imaging of Chekhov's The Seagull, entitled Stupid F**king Bird, was one of the ten most produced plays in the country in 2015 and has had more than 150 productions worldwide. Other plays include The Heal, JQA, Life Sucks, No Sisters, District Merchants, Who Am I This Time? & Other Conundrums of Love, The Chosen, My Name Is Asher Lev, The Gift of Nothing, Me...Jane: The Dreams & Adventures of Young Jane Goodall, and many more.
