From the Director

What makes you feel safe and stable? What would you be willing to do to maintain your safety and stability? These are the questions that run deep under the foundation of Kimberley Belflower's watershed work John Proctor is the Villain, a play that requires us to reexamine both The Crucible, one of the most commonly read and seen plays in the US, and the real history that both plays draw from, the Salem Witch Trials.

Centering the lives of teenage girls—an often feared and scapegoated demographic in our country—Belflower asks every one of us to interrogate where we stand and who we stand with, not only in moments of heightened fear and suspicion, but in the everyday ways we defend or challenge the communal values we were taught, and that we are teaching. Most of us assume we will be seen as a hero in the eyes of future generations. But will we?

Director Bio



Susan Stroupe (she/her) is a Baltimore-based theater maker who specializes in collaborative, immersive, and devised works. 

my Hay Day neighborhood for always being there for me.





To this end, each production entered is eligible for a response by a regional KCACTF representative, and selected students and faculty are invited to participate in KCACTF programs involving scholarships, internships, grants and awards for actors, directors, dramaturgs, playwrights, designers, stage managers and critics at both the regional and national levels.

Productions entered on the Participating level are eligible for invitation to the KCACTF regional festival and may also be considered for national awards recognizing outstanding achievement in production, design, direction and performance.

Last year more than 1,500 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.
